

Family Night

On Wednesday night, families and friends are encouraged to visit their Scouts at camp! We ask that visitors check in at the camp office when they arrive. **Check in begins at 4pm and ends at 6pm**. Camp staff will be coordinating parking in the main camp lot. A limited number of camp vehicles may be available to transport those visitors requiring assistance getting around camp. Units are encouraged to arrange meals on their own via potluck or cooking for their visitors. For those unable to make those arrangements, camp offers meals in the dining hall for visitors at \$8.00 per person. There is no charge for campers (youth or adult). Tickets for visitors may be purchased at the Trading Post. Units needing meals in the dining hall Wednesday evening will need to sign up in the camp office.

Units are also encouraged to provide programming for visitors to camp. Areas will be open early evening in an open house format to allow Scouts to show their families what they have been doing during the week.



Scout's Own Service

On Thursday evening, after the campwide cookout, units are requested to host each other in a Centennial Anniversary Carnival. Each campsite or unit should develop a carnival game or Scout skill demonstration that can engage campsite visitors during the evening. Carnival activities will be judged on creativity, interactivity, troop pride, Scout spirit, and use of theme. The theme for the carnival is "Legends are Forged Here!" Units should make plans for rotating Scouts in and out as activity host and carnival participants. Award categories include Best Overall, Campers Choice, and Directors Choice.

Camp will also welcome special alumni to celebrate the anniversary on this night. Scouts and Scouters may sign up in the camp office to serve as a camp tour host for members of our alumni groups.

Camp Mitigwa will also offer Merit Badge Midway during this time. This year, Scouts will be required to register for Merit Badge Midway. Participants in Merit Badge Midway will be unavailable to be activity hosts. Please plan accordingly. More information about offerings in the Merit Badge Midway can be found in the Merit Badge Program Guide*.

Scouting is founded on the notion that the skills developed lead the a good life. Scouting has continually reaffirmed its commitment to exploring the spiritual world and in performing one's Duty to God. Units are encouraged to sign up to host Scout's Own Services as a service to camp and other participating units. Contact the Camp Commissioner Corps to confirm an available time to reserve the chapel. Units wishing to invite other units should describe the spiritual aspects/tradition of the service for individuals to judge appropriate participation for themselves. Units are highly encouraged to consider interfaith services. Some resources will be available at camp for units wishing to host a service at camp, or you may develop your own materials.



Camp Mitigwa Mayhem Derby

You and your pit crew can compete in a checkpoint race across camp Mitigwa in your own custom Scout powered race cars. Troops will have all <u>off season</u> and all week at camp up until the big race on Friday to construct their Derby car. The race track will go to different areas of camp where the racers will compete mini-games in order to advance onto the next area. Trophies will be awarded after the checkered flag. Hope to see you in the winner circle this summer!



Guidelines

- Size: no longer than 6 foot, no higher than 4.5 foot, and no wider than 4 foot.
- Must run on four wheels (no three wheelers or wheelie bars)
- Troops must be able to push and/or pull car safely (No automation. <u>Must be "Scout" powered</u>)
- Car must be able to haul gear (size of a military duffel bag)
- Car can be decorated anyway troops see fit
- Anyone can participate in their own division, anyone can complete the tasks
- Scouts riding in the derby car must wear a masked helmet and elbow and knee pads
- Scouts riding in the derby car must be able to hold on to something stationary and be seated at all times while the car is moving
- Two divisions will be offered- Scout (under 18) and Scouter (over 18) NO OUTLAW DIVISIONS

Details

- Derby cars can be made out of any material of your choice, but the vehicle must be safe and operational. This will be verified at the pre-derby check-in.
- Vehicles will be displayed during Wednesday's family night and will be judged during that time for Best in Show.
- Best in Show awards are based on two categories
 – overall best looking and best fit of camp
 theme.
- Some materials may be available at camp for construction during the time you are there; however, this is not guaranteed and units are encouraged to build prior to attending camp.
- Units are responsible for their derby car including, but not limited to transport, use and removal from camp.

Prize Categories (Awarded in each division- Scout & Scouter):

- Best in Show (Overall and Theme Related)- Theme: "Legends are Forged Here!"
- Best Station Skill Score
 Overall sum of points earned at each mini game

Unit Recognitions

Mitigwa Scout Reservation designs programs that serve multiple levels of engagement. To celebrate our centennial anniversary, Mitigwa's unit recognitions are for unit level participation in camp activities. There are two levels of recognition; honor troop and legendary troop. Patrol Leader Councils should strive for the best and make plans to achieve legendary status.

Honor Troop

The Honor Troop award recognizes units that participate in summer camp program and contribute to the Scouting spirit at camp, as a unit. A unit photo and roster of 2023 Camp Honor Units will be included in the anniversary time capsule. Those units earning Honor Troop will receive a unit ribbon for their unit flag and may purchase Honor Troop pins from the trading post to wear with their camp patches. To earn the Honor Troop award, please complete the following requirements:

Legendary Troop

The Legendary Troop award recognizes those units that go beyond the requirements of the Honor Troop award in an effort to make camp fun for everyone. Those units earning the Legendary Troop award understanding summer camp as a community of Scouts and Scouters playing the game of Scouting together. Those units earning Legendary Troop will receive a unit ribbon for their unit flag and may purchase Legendary Troop pins from the trading post to wear with their camp patches. To earn the Legendary Troop award, please complete the following requirements, in addition to the requirements for the Honor Troop award:

- 11. Unit represented at every leader training
- 12. 25% Unit participation in Sunrise program
- 13. 25% Unit participation in Sunset/Twilight program
- 14. One leader earns legendary leader
- 15. One Scout earns Honor camper
- 16. One camper earns the gratitude leaf
- 17. One camper earns service leaf
- 18. One camper hearts hospitality leaf

Leader Meetings

To pass on important information, camp holds meetings with important unit leaders. Sunday, after dinner, all unit leaders (Scoutmasters and Senior Patrol Leaders) are invited to an joint session with the Camp Director and Program Director to learn about upcoming activities and any updates to program or support services. Many of the other meetings are broken out by adult and youth leaders to help foster youth leadership within units.

Mitigwa Morning Moot

One Scoutmaster and one senior patrol leader from each unit is invited to attend the Mitigwa Morning Moot, a special breakfast, Monday morning hosted by the Mitigwa Commissioner Corps. Dietary requests should be requested via registration and campers are reminded to alert the director of food services when they arrive at camp on Sunday.





Senior Patrol Meetings

Scouting is a youth driven organization, supported by adults. This means we place a lot of ownership in the program with our youth leaders. Everyday at 4:30pm, Senior Patrol Leaders will have a meeting hosted by the Program Director, at the Brown Benches. At this meeting, units will receive important program information, including being able to sign up for special program opportunities. Units are highly encouraged to have representation at these meetings.

Adult Leader Meetings

Adult Leader Meetings are a time set aside to remind leaders of program opportunities and alert them to changes. It is also a time that leaders can share insight to their camp experience. What things are going right? What things can camp improve on? Finally, it is also a time to check in as a camp community, raising concern about inter-unit relations and celebrate community achievements and support. Units will also have opportunities to sign up for adult programs and other unit level activity requiring adults to sign up for them. Meetings are hosted in the Scoutmaster's lounge, daily at 11:00am by the Camp Director. Units are highly encouraged to have representation at these meetings.



Adult Leader Training

Mitigwa Scout Reservation is committed to providing quality supplemental training to ensure each leader is able to deliver on the promise of Scouting. Units are highly encouraged to take advantage of these trainings developed by the Mitigwa Commissioner Corps and provided by key leaders of Mid Iowa Council. Adult Leader training is offered Monday through Thursday at 10:00am in the Scoutmaster's Lounge.



The Order of the Arrow as a Unit Program

Monday features leadership from the Mitigwa Lodge discussing how Order of the Arrow functions as a unit level program that can increase youth retention.

Teaching Citizenship in Society

Scouting is an inclusive program that benefits all communities it serves. New requirements for Eagle Scout and new efforts to build inclusion have developed into Citizenship in Society. This training discusses essential concepts and sensitive approaches to teaching this new Merit Badge. This course is offered Tuesdays.

Building the Bridge: Webelos Retention to Troops

Strong units are built upon a relationship between units and the young people they serve within their communities. Units with strong relationships with packs have larger participation numbers and make more significant impacts in their community. In a world that needs Scouting more than ever, this Wednesday training discusses how to build the relationship between units and packs to strengthen Scouting in local communities.

Where to go Camping Roundtable

Thursday's training features a leader favorite, a roundtable chance to discuss with other unit leaders the best place to go camping. Each unit has their traditional spots, but need a new adventure every once in awhile. Come share your favorites and learn about new gems waiting to be discovered by your unit.

Aquatics Supervision

Camp Mitigwa will tentatively offer Swimming and Water Rescue and Paddle Craft Safety course. These courses help units to host their own aquatics activities and certify their own BSA Swimming Tests. Please review the BSA National website for information about the course requirements and content. Training subject to staffing. More information to be released.



Legendary Leader Recognition

Adult Leaders give of their time, talent, and treasure to make Scouting happen. We want to recognize leaders that engage in the game of Scouting. By completing activities designed to engage Scouts, leaders demonstrate their commitment to becoming a Legendary Leader. The Legendary Leader Award is a backpatch made up of five pieces coming together to form a fleur de lis and representing requirement completions. Artwork coming soon. Requirement details below. Do you have what it takes to be a Legend?

Scoutmaster

With the help of your unit, build and construct a campsite gateway that includes a hospitality station with a place to refill water bottles. Additional points awarded for a coffee station included. Gateways must be completed before the Carnival.

Songmaster

Show that Scout spirit with a Scout song parody of a popular song. Leaders are encouraged to perform their song during the Songmaster competition Tuesday evening. Leaders completing this requirement must write down their lyrics and turn them in to the Program Director.



Storymaster

We all have our favorite stories we like to tell. From the funny to the inspiring, we use stories to connect Scouting values to our lives. Share your inspirational or funny story to spread the Scouting spirit. Those completing this are encouraged to participate in the Storymaster competition on Monday nights. Leaders are asked to write down their story and turn it in to the Program Director

Gamemaster

Scout leaders must have three things in their toolbox at a moments notice; a song, a story, or a game! Games help Scouts practice their skills and identify areas for growth. To meet this requirement, share or develop a new game to teach Scout skills or reinforce Scouting values. To complete this requirement, write down the objectives, materials, and procedures for your game and turn them in to the Program Director.

Servicemaster

Registering for Camp:

Units may register for a campsite using https://campiowa.org/. A \$100 deposit is due at the time of reserving your campsite. Leaders may upload their unit roster at a later date with the names of youth and adults that will be attending camp. By March 1st, all campers must be named and any spots that were estimated but not named should be removed. There will be a \$150 minimum payment for each youth that is named.

Fees must be paid in full by April 1. Merit badge class registration opens March 15. Units may only register for merit badges after \$150 minimum payment per youth is made. This deters units from signing up Scouts who will not make it to camp and filling merit badge slots that may be better used to serve other units.

The *All-Star Troop* is a chance for Scouts to go to camp that might not be able to attend with their unit. Parents and troop leaders may register their individual Scouts for an All-Star Troop through https://campiowa.org/. Payment schedules apply regardless of camping as a traditional unit or with the All-Star Troop. All-Star week will take place the 6th week of camp (July 16-22).

Camp Refund Policy:

The campsite reservation deposit is non-refundable. It will be used to help pay total unit fees. From April 1st through May 31st there will be a \$100 fee for any Scout or adult that is cancelled, though transfers are allowed. **After June 1st, there will be no refunds allowed** except per the regular council refund policy- **https://scoutingiowa.org/refundpolicy/**
