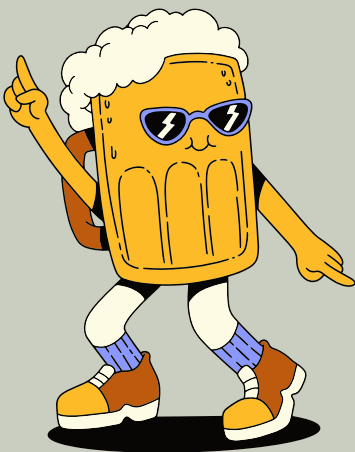

Monday



### Break The Ice Challenge

Campers team up for a fast-paced relay packed with teamwork and problem solving! Pairs race a three-legged obstacle course to reach an ice block containing keys. Using a ball peen hammer, they carefully chip out one key at a time before racing back so the next pair can go. Once all keys are freed, the team unlocks their bag of wooden puzzle pieces and works together to complete the puzzle.

Tuesday



### The Maze Master Challenge

Campers will put their teamwork and problem-solving skills to the test in this camp-wide adventure! Teams are given one single clue that leads to a hidden croquet ball somewhere around camp. They must work together to decipher the clue, find the ball, and bring it back to the pavilion to place it at the start of the maze table. Finish the maze to complete the challenge.

Wednesday



### Knot So Fast!

In this teamwork challenge, a rope is threaded through and wrapped around a series of obstacles along the course. Scouts are clipped or tied onto the rope using webbing and must work together to navigate the entire course. Each Scout moves through the obstacles one at a time while staying connected to the rope. The challenge is complete only when the entire troop has successfully made it through the course.

Thursday



### Beam & Conquer

Campers begin by carrying bean bags across a balance beam. From the end of the beam, they throw the bean bags to knock down a puzzle target. Only two bean bags may be carried at a time, so campers must make multiple trips until all the pieces are knocked down. Once the puzzle is down, the entire team must cross the beam and work together to reassemble it.

### Titan RACE DAY

Gear up for the ultimate team relay adventure! In the Titan Race, Scouts will race across camp, tackling exciting challenges at each program area before passing the baton to their next teammate. From mastering outdoor skills to solving tricky puzzles, every challenge will test their strength, smarts, and teamwork. The team that conquers all the challenges the fastest will claim victory! Who will rise as the Titans of camp? Let the race begin!

## Trades (in Ecology)-Candle Making

Campers will craft their very own candles in this hands-on, creative workshop! They'll melt wax, choose colors and scents, and pour their designs into molds or jars to make a one-of-a-kind creation. Along the way, they'll learn about the science of melting and cooling while expressing their personal style. Each camper will take home a handmade candle, a glowing reminder of summer fun!



## Scoutcraft-Fishing

Fishing is a favorite pastime of Scouts and Scouters. Receive information on fishing practices and compete for the largest catch.

## Inspiration Outpost-Carved Wooden Spoon

Scouts will learn the traditional skill of carving a wooden spoon from a solid piece of wood. Scouts will explore basic wood selection, safe tool handling, and simple carving techniques to shape, smooth, and finish their own functional utensil. Along the way, they'll practice patience, craftsmanship, and attention to detail while creating something they can use on future campouts.

## EAGLE ACADEMY

### Totin' Chip & Firem'n Chit

MONDAY

For Scouts needing to earn or re-earn their wood tools or firecraft privileges, these courses teach safety basics and effective techniques. Eagle Academy participants are highly encouraged to participate.

## OTHER AREAS

---

### Order of the Arrow – Blank Dining Hall

MONDAY

All OA members are invited to a special evening to celebrate their membership in the National Honor Society of Scouting. Please wear your sash!

### Scoutcraft – Pioneering Projects

MONDAY

Campers will learn classic outdoor skills as they design and build hands-on pioneering projects using ropes and wooden poles. They'll practice knots and lashings to create useful structures like simple shelters, tripods, or small camp gadgets.

### STEAM – Popsicle Stick Bridges

TUESDAY

Campers will become junior engineers as they design and build their own bridges using popsicle sticks and glue! Working individually or in teams, they'll learn about balance, strength, and structure while creating a bridge that can hold as much weight as possible.

After building, we'll test each bridge to see whose design is the strongest! It's a fun mix of creativity, teamwork, and hands-on STEM learning.

### Inspiration Outpost – Woven Cord Baskets

Campers will explore the art of weaving in this hands-on craft activity! Using colorful cords, they'll learn basic weaving techniques to create their own small, sturdy baskets.

This activity encourages patience, creativity, and fine motor skills, while giving each camper a chance to design a unique basket they can take home – perfect for holding treasures or showing off their crafty skills!



# TWILIGHT PROGRAMS

## MONDAY

### WILDLIFE CALLING

Campers will step into the wild as they learn to mimic animal calls and sounds! From bird songs to woodland creatures, they'll practice listening closely, using their voices, and even creating simple call tools to communicate like wildlife.

### BOARD GAMES PAVILION

Scouts and Scouters alike are invited to the pavilion for an evening of board game fun! Bring your favorite game from home or jump into one of the many games available at camp. It's a great chance to relax, laugh, and enjoy some friendly competition together.

## TUESDAY

### STAR GAZING ECOLOGY

Combine the wonders of the night sky with the beauty of nature in this Ecology stargazing experience. Scouts will learn to identify constellations, planets, and celestial events. A perfect blend of science, nature, and the cosmos!

### NIGHT CLIMB - GLOW STICK COPE & CLIMBING

Experience COPE & Climbing like never before — with glow sticks lighting the way! Scale the climbing wall in the dark, glowing with every move, or test your balance and teamwork by stacking and climbing crates as high as you can. It's a thrilling challenge of skill, strategy, and a little bit of glow-in-the-dark fun!

On Wednesday night, families and friends are encouraged to visit their Scouts at camp! We ask that visitors check in at the camp office when they arrive. Check-in begins at 4:00 pm and ends at 6:00 pm. Camp staff will be coordinating parking in the main camp lot. A limited number of camp vehicles may be available to transport those visitors requiring assistance getting around camp. Units are encouraged to arrange meals on their own via potluck or cooking for their visitors. For those unable to make those arrangements, the camp offers meals in the dining hall for visitors at \$10.00 per person. There is no charge for campers (youth or adult). Tickets for visitors may be purchased at the Trading Post. Units needing meals in the dining hall on Wednesday evening will need to sign up in the camp office.



# FAMILY NIGHT

Units are also encouraged to provide programming for visitors to camp. Areas will be open early evening in an open house format to allow Scouts to show their families what they have been doing during the week.

A staff-led campfire will bring families and Scouts together in the amphitheater as family night activities wind down. The campfire will last approximately 30 minutes. Units will line up by the Maytag Pool and families will proceed to the amphitheater.



Family Night will conclude with the Mitigwa Lodge Order of the Arrow Call-Out Ceremony. Family night will end at approximately 10:30pm, so please plan accordingly.

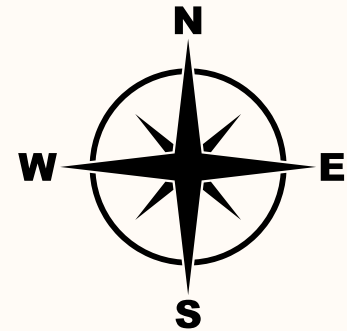
For those visitors desiring to leave before the OA Call-Out, they may do so following the campfire and before the call-out ceremony begins. Instructions will be shared at the campfire.

# LEADER MEETINGS



## Arrival Sunday Meetings

Sunday at 4:15 PM in the chapel, there will be a mandatory all-adult meeting to go over camp procedures and emergency information. During this time there will be supervised, camp staff-led activities for your youth. Immediately following this meeting will be the New Leader Orientation.



## Senior Patrol Meetings

Scouting is a youth driven organization, supported by adults. This means we place a lot of ownership in the program with our youth leaders. Every day at 4:30PM, Senior Patrol Leaders will have a meeting hosted by the Program Director, at the Brown Benches. At this meeting, units will receive important program information, including being able to sign up for special program opportunities. Units are highly encouraged to have representation at these meetings.



## Adult Leader Meetings

Adult Leader meetings are each morning at 11:00 AM (location TBD). Coffee and snacks will be served. This is a time set aside to remind leaders of program opportunities and alert them to changes. It is also a time that leaders can share insight into their camp experience. What things are going right? What things can camp improve on? Finally, it is also a time to check in as a camp community, raising concerns about inter-unit relations and celebrate community achievements and support. Units will also have opportunities to sign up for adult programs and other unit-level activities that require adults to sign Scouts up. Units are highly encouraged to have representation at these meetings.

## and Challenges



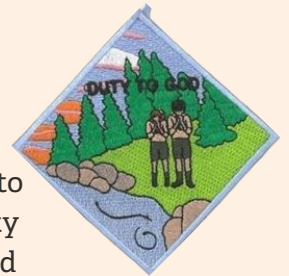
### Legends Awards

In the spirit of awards from days gone by, we are introducing the Mitigwa Legends Award. This award will require your Scout to visit every area at Camp Mitigwa, and complete a variety of required skills dating back

to the beginning of Scouting. Each Scout will be responsible for tracking their achievements on a checklist, and when completed they can turn the list in at 3 Oaks Trading Post and purchase the Mitigwa Legends Patch. This year for our 2nd and 3rd year participants there is a second-year and third-year award. We also added an Adult Legends Award.

### Mitigwa Duty to God Award

Scouts that are hoping to achieve this award will be required to complete a series of requirements that demonstrate their Duty to God. When complete a Duty to God patch may be purchased at 3 Oaks trading post. Requirement cards will be available at check in on Sunday.



### Commissioner Coffee Club

Leaders that attend 100 percent of the daily leaders meeting and training will be inducted into the Commissioner Coffee Club. Don't worry if you are a tea drinker, we are inclusive.



### Helping Hand Award

We are always looking for a little extra help around camp. This award is for those leaders that forgo their nap and help around the reservation. Tasks can be designed to accommodate the interest of the leader. Please see our Camp Commissioner for more information.

# UNIT RECOGNITIONS

Mitigwa Scout Reservation designs programs that serve multiple levels of engagement. Mitigwa's unit recognitions are for unit level participation in camp activities. There are two levels of recognition; honor troop and legendary troop. Patrol Leader Councils should strive for the best and make plans to achieve legendary status.

## Honor Troop

The Honor Troop award recognizes units that participate in summer camp program and contribute to the Scouting spirit at camp, as a unit. Those units earning Honor Troop will receive a unit ribbon for their unit flag. To earn the Honor Troop award, please complete the following requirements:

1. Participate in a Baden-Powell service project.
2. Have a representative at every Leader Meeting.
3. Have a representative at every Senior Patrol Leader Meeting.
4. On time to flag ceremonies.
5. Unit participation in the Service Corps.
6. Unit participation in the Chaplain's Corps.
7. Earn the Clean Sweep Award.
8. Host or co-host a Scout's Own Service.



## Legendary Troop

The Legendary Troop recognizes those units that go beyond the requirements of the Honor Troop award in an effort to make camp fun for everyone. Those units earning the Legendary Troop award understand summer camp as a community of Scouts and Scouters playing the game of Scouting together.

1. Unit represented at every leader training.
2. 50% Unit participation in Sunrise Program.
3. 50% Unit participation in Sunset/Twilight program.
4. 75% of leaders earn Mitigwa Legend award.
5. 75% of Scouts earn Mitigwa Legend award.

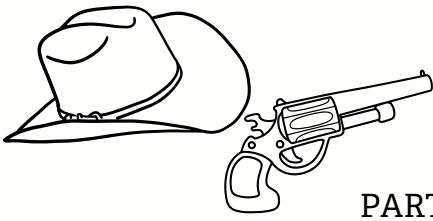
## Registering for Camp:

Units may register for a campsite using <https://campiowa.org/>. A \$100 deposit is due at the time of reserving your campsite. Leaders may upload their unit roster at a later date with the names of youth and adults that will be attending camp. By March 1st, all campers must be named and any spots that were estimated but not named should be removed. There will be a \$150 minimum payment for each youth that is named.

Fees must be paid in full by April 1st. Merit badge class registration opens March 20th. Units may only register for merit badges after \$150 minimum payment per youth is made. This deters units from signing up Scouts who will not make it to camp and filling merit badge slots that may be better used to serve other units.

## Camp Refund Policy:

The campsite reservation deposit is non-refundable. It will be used to help pay total unit fees. From April 1st through May 31st there will be a \$100 fee for any Scout or adult that is cancelled, though transfers are allowed. After June 1st, there will be no refunds allowed except per the regular council refund policy—<https://scoutingiowa.org/refundpolicy>.



COWBOY ACTION SHOOTING PROGRAM  
PARTICIPATION AND HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

Mitigwa Scout Reservation, Mid-Iowa Council will be conducting a Scout cowboy action shooting program. In this program, Scouts will shoot a rifle, pistol, and shotgun under the supervision of an NRA Range Safety Officer and NRA certified instructors. Scouts will be required to wear eye protection and hearing protection at all times while on the range. Scouts are expected to abide by all safety rules and the instructions of the Range Safety Officer(s) and rifle, pistol, and shotgun instructor(s).

I, the undersigned, give my child, \_\_\_\_\_, permission to participate in this program. I understand that participation in the activity involves a certain degree of risk. I have carefully considered the risk involved and have given consent for my child to participate in the activity. I understand that participation in the activity is entirely voluntary and requires participants to abide by the rules and standards of conduct. I release the Boy Scouts of America, the local council, the activity coordinators, and all employees, volunteers, related parties, or other organizations associated with the activity from any and all claims or liability arising out of this participation.

For safety, my child and I agree that they will do the following or they will be removed from the program. I understand that any additional cost associated with participation in this program will not be refunded if my child is removed for not following the rules below.

1. Complete a range safety briefing.
2. Wear all safety gear at all times while on the range.
3. Follow all the safety rules provided in the briefing.
4. Follow the instructions of the Range Safety Officer(s) and rifle, pistol, and shotgun instructor(s).
5. Do not handle the firearms until instructed to do so by the instructor(s).
6. Is 14 years of age, or 13 and has completed the eighth grade, as of the start of the class and will be in full compliance with all local, state, and federal guidelines, including age restrictions and original equipment manufacturer standards.
